The Taproot Foundation is a highly successful non profit Chicago foundation that makes business talent available to charitable organizations in need of professional assistance to update key agency materials and expand community outreach. Over the last 18 months, these grants resulted in new Key Messaging and our exciting new Visual Identity. A New Beginning for a Dad & Grad

Luis struggled in school; he had a difficult time focusing on his studies due to mounting gang activity. Luis desperately tried to keep away from gang affiliations, but was continually assaulted. He found himself engaged continually in school fighting and was finally expelled. Luis had little hope of finishing high school, let alone attending college. As a young father, he wanted to build a good life for himself and his young family. Luis heard about *El Cuarto Año*, the Association House high school, and his whole world soon changed. He enrolled at Association House with only two credits - needing 20 to graduate. He realized just how far behind he was, and hope seemed distant again. But the teachers at Association House proved different than any he had ever known. They not only offered individualized class instruction but also the mentoring and counseling he desperately needed to clear his head of the violence and to

focus on studies. Luis went from failing grades to obtaining A's on his report card. He joined school activities, including service on the Technology Team and helping others as a teaching assistant. He earned additional credit through the *Extra Learning On-line* program, enhancing his skills in Math, Reading, and Science. As graduation nears, Luis is getting ready to attend Chicago's Truman College to study automotive technology. He aspires to become a master mechanic or a mechanical engineer. Luis is deeply appreciative of the second chance that he has received at Association House. Recently, Luis was asked what life would be like had not come to the high school. He was very reflective. "That is a very scary thought to me" he said. "I would be maybe working at a dead end job, struggling to take care of my son, or worse, in jail."

Behavioral Health

A strong array of Behavioral Healthcare Services, including prevention, treatment and education are offered at Association House. Culturally competent and evidence based programs are delivered by a team of licensed staff. These caring and dedicated professionals include therapists, psychiatrists, nurses, support specialists, certified community educators, casemanagers and counselors. Our services are offered in both English and Spanish, and are designed to help children, youth and adults facing emotional and mental health issues. We offer help and hope to individuals experiencing substance abuse and addiction problems, and persons with developmental disabilities. Many programs are covered by Medicaid and Medicare. Our integrated approach to healthcare is further enhanced by a highly successful Healthy Lifestyles program which offers community health prevention and wellness activities tailored to every age group.



Child Welfare

The Child Welfare Division serves hundreds of Chicago children and families each year. Key focus areas include prevention, intervention, and finding loving homes for children through guardianship or adoption. Staff work diligently with families to keep children in their own homes whenever possible. Our residential program, *La Casita*, provides a nurturing and structured group home for boys with developmental disabilities who are 13 to 18 years of age. Providing knowledge and skill building to families in need offers hope to those who want to make a better life for their children. Licensed and credentialed staff make up a strong professional Child Welfare team who serve children and families with compassion and care.

Community Services

Community Services touch the lives of thousands of community residents each year. Offered within this area are ten workforce development programs integrated into a highly successful Career Center. Association House provides career-oriented adult education programs, sector training in the technology, allied health, and customer service fields, along with employment programs, and emergency services. Through this continuum of programs, participants build financial security, and achieve economic self-sufficiency. Employment program graduates move from job readiness training into job placements or internships. Adult education programs are offered in English and Spanish, and a 70-seat technology center supports the large range of programs that help our neighbors advance their lives. Continuing a century old tradition of providing basic needs to those that need it most, individuals receive food, clothing, and public benefits assistance.



El Cuarto Año High School

Association House's High School, *El Cuarto Año*, offers small class sizes, high teacher to student ratio, and individual learning plans with an emphasis on technology to each of its 105 students. It is an ideal school setting for re-enrolled students who have left the traditional school setting. In collaboration with the Youth Connection Charter Schools, Alternative Schools Network, and Chicago Public Schools, *El Cuarto Año* offers a variety of tutoring and mentoring programs along with competitive academic studies. For many young people, this is the second chance they need to continue their education, earn their high school diplomas, and find viable employment. Students are able to achieve their dream of graduation often overcoming great odds through hard work and dedication.



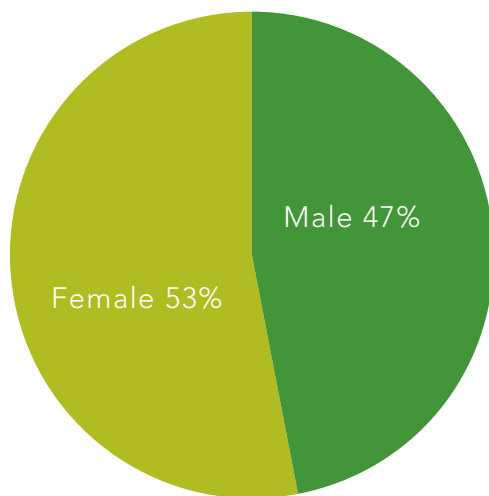
Out of School Time

Literacy lessons adapted to children's interests, arts education, and quality technology education are the hallmarks of our *Out of School Time Program*. The program offers unique opportunities for community children and teens, ages 6-17. Kids enrolled in the program are taught to face the challenges that develop from an overburdened public school system as well as the intense influence of street activity and violence in Humboldt Park, one of Chicago's toughest neighborhoods. Providing a safe-haven for growth and empowerment, students have the chance to gain skills in a safe, and nurturing environment. Out of School Time runs during both the academic year and with extended hours as a Summer Day Camp. New this year, a sitter service program was piloted in response to the growing need for on-site child care.

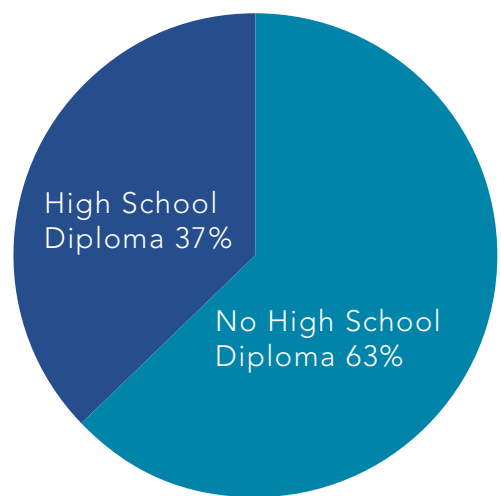

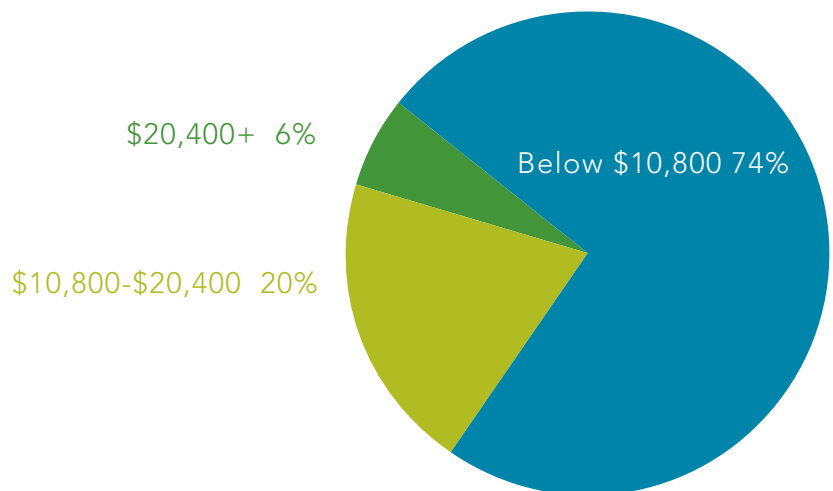
GENDER

ANNUAL HOUSEHOLD INCOME



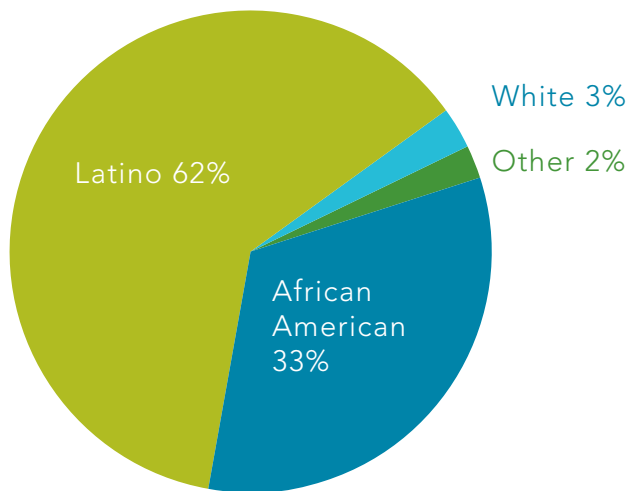

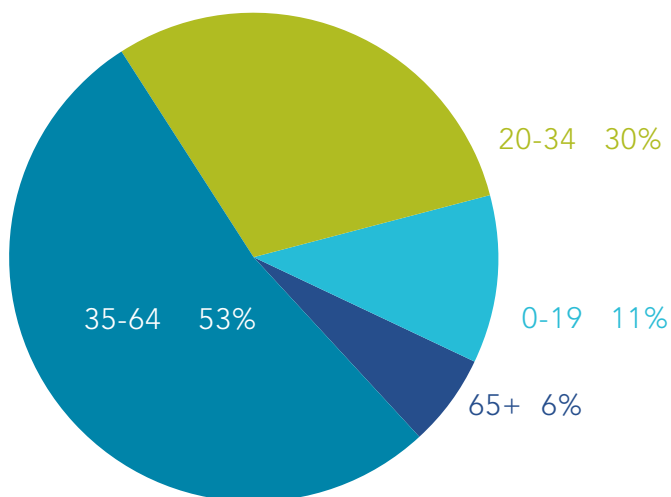

OF THE ASSOCIATION HOUSE PARTICIPANT POPULATION

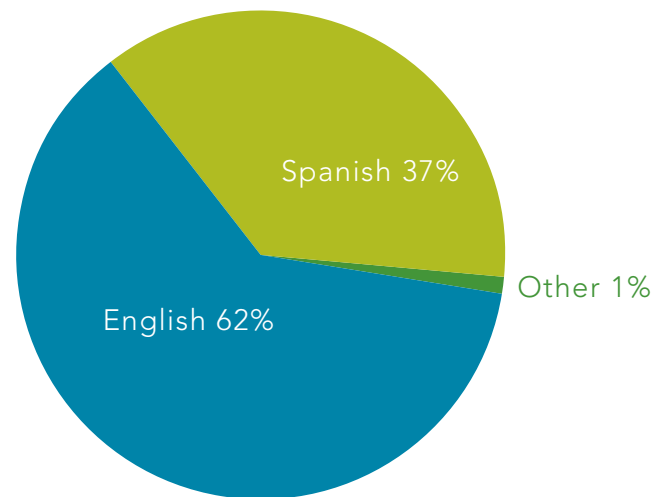
ETHNICITY



AGE



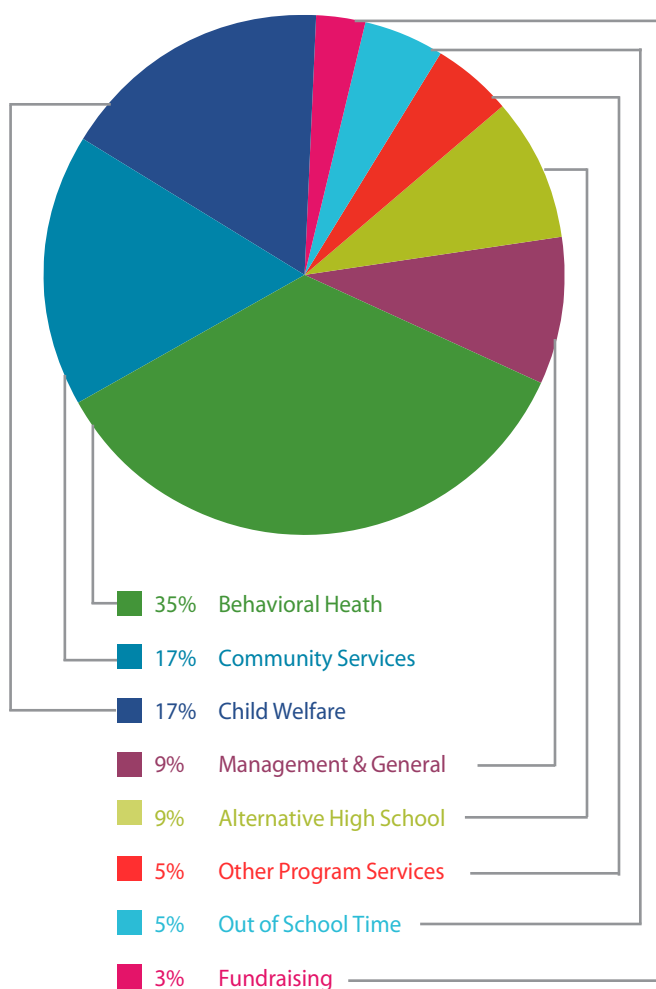
PRIMARY LANGUAGE
